Musical Terms	
<b>Beat/ Pulse</b>	The steady pulse that keeps going through a piece of music like a clock.
<b>Rhythm</b>	Patterns of long and short sounds used in music.
<b>Tempo</b>	How fast or slow the music is. The tempo can change during a piece of music.
<b>Dynamics</b>	How loud or quiet music sounds. Dynamics can change during a piece of music.
<b>Texture</b>	Sections where there are fewer performers and sections where there are more performers.
<b>Pitch</b>	How high or low a note sounds.

What is samba?
 <b>Samba</b> is a lively style of music and dance from <b>Brazil</b> .
 It combines African rhythms, Portuguese influences, and Brazilian culture.
 Samba is often heard during the <b>Rio Carnival</b> , one of the biggest festivals in the world.

Samba Instruments	
<b>Surdo</b>	Large, deep-sounding bass drum
<b>Tamborim</b>	Small hand drum played with a stick
<b>Agogô</b>	Metal bells (usually two)
<b>Caixa</b>	Snare drum
<b>Ganzá / Shaker</b>	Metal or woven shaker
<b>Whistle (Apito)</b>	Used by the leader
