


- How to hold a pencil
- How to use a paint brush
- How to make marks on a piece of paper



Sketching pencils

Pencils have different grades depending on how hard or soft it is.

We usually use a **HB** when we write in pencil but when we draw, the basic sketching pencil we use is grade **B**.



Pastels

Soft pastels are like chalk. They have an intense colour but can crumble easily.



Oil pastels are similar to wax crayons. They are bright in colour but will not smudge easily.



Marbling

Ink is dropped onto water and swirled to make a pattern. When you place paper on top of the water, the **marbling** pattern is transferred to the paper.



Printing

Texture and pattern can be created using different tools on **clay** or by **rubbing** objects with a crayon through paper.



Chalk and Charcoal

Chalk is white and made from rock. It can crumble easily and can be smudged.



Charcoal is black and made from wood



which can crumble easily. It gives a very intense line which can be smudged easily.
