


What I should already know

Sketching pencils

For basic sketching pencil we use grade **B**, but we can also use **2B** and **4B** for shading. As the number gets higher, the pencil gets softer.



H=Hard **B**=Black

Pastels

Soft pastels are like chalk. They have an intense colour but can crumble easily.



Oil pastels are similar to wax crayons. They are bright in colour but will not smudge easily.



Printing & 3D

String printing can be used to **press** or **roll** a pattern onto paper.





Texture can be created in **clay** by **pressing** in tools/objects, or **joining** other pieces of **clay** together.

Chalk and Charcoal

Chalk is white and made from rock. It can crumble easily and can be smudged.



Charcoal is black and made from wood which can crumble
