Impact area	Summary		
What has been the immest on municipation?	43% of all Year 6's and 55% of all Year 5's have represented the school in competitive sport. This is slightly down on previous years, however this does not show the number of children invited, as we had many more children this year choosing not to take part, which maybe post-Covid, but does mean we need to work with these children to change perception.		
What has been the impact on pupils' participation?	In Year 3 and 4 we had a significant improvement in participation compared to previous years – with 51% of Year 3's and 30% of year 4's representing the school at a sport.		
	Overall, in Key Stage 2, 60% of all the children have represented the school at competitive sport 2021/22.		
What has been the impact on pupils' attainment?	Investment in the new PE curriculum (GetSet4PE) has meant that children across the school are following a progressive scheme of work allowing them to access P.E. at their level. Children have enjoyed new schemes of work such as handball and yoga.
