Every year, schools across the country participate in Safer internet day. This year's focus is on taking time to talk about life online and takes place on the 7th of February.



Year 2 Trip to Milestones Museum

We enjoyed learning about how things have changed and spotted many similarities and differences between homes and shops now and then.

We enjoyed several activities throughout the day which included: a taste of a Viking farm, playing traditional games, learning key battle skills and we took part in a Viking trial to learn how criminals were dealt with! Despite the rain, we all had a wonderful day and enjoyed our hands-on learning.





Year 3 Tribal Tales Day

On Monday 9th January Year 3 had a great introduction to their new topic, Tribal Tales. In the morning they were very active archaeologists piecing together their finds from the Stone age, Bronze Age and the Iron Age. They created cave paintings using oil and charcoal and as hunter-gatherers, also made their own useful pouches, using hessian, wool and running stitches.

In the afternoon, they learnt more about how the Stone age lasted a very long time and is divided into three periods – the Palaeolithic, the Mesolithic and the Neolithic.
