#### Welcome to our february Newsletter

Cars mounting pavements, driving towards families and young children

People driving at speed along the road

People conducting three point turns outside the school at busy pick up and drop off times

People parking up and dropping off children at the crossing point where families are trying to cross

People parking on pavements making them unsafe to travel along

People parking on the yellow zig zag lines opposite school

People double parking next to the laybys outside school - this leads to near accidents as people overtake as others are crossing at the crossing point

People parking across neighbour's driveways or so close to other cars people can't get into their own vehicles



### How can you help?


- Walk to school when you can
